ELIGIBILITY TO APPLY FOR A DISSERTATION FELLOWSHIP

- Citizens, nationals, and permanent residents (holders of a Permanent Resident Card) of the United States, individuals granted deferred action status under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals Program¹, political asylees, and refugees, regardless of race, national origin, religion, gender, age, disability, or sexual orientation.
- Individuals with evidence of superior academic achievement (such as grade point average, class rank, honors or other distinctions),
- Individuals committed to a career in teaching and research at the college or university level,
- Individuals enrolled in an eligible **research-based (dissertation-required)** program leading to a Ph.D. or Sc.D. degree at a **non-proprietary (not for profit) U.S. institution** of higher education who will complete the dissertation in a period of 9-12 months during the 2020-2021 academic year, but no later than Fall 2021, and
- Individuals who have not earned a doctoral degree at any time, in any field.

¹ Eligibility includes individuals with current-status under the DACA Program, as well as individuals whose status may have lapsed but who continue to meet all the USCIS guidelines for DACA.

POSITIVE FACTORS FOR SELECTION

- Evidence of superior academic achievement
- Degree of promise of continuing achievement as scholars and teachers
- Capacity to respond in pedagogically productive ways to the learning needs of students from diverse backgrounds
- Sustained personal engagement with communities that are underrepresented in the academy and an ability to bring this asset to learning, teaching, and scholarship at the college and university level
- Likelihood of using the diversity of human experience as an educational resource in teaching and scholarship
- Membership in one or more of the following groups whose underrepresentation in the American professoriate has been severe and longstanding:
 - Alaska Natives (Aleut, Eskimo or other Indigenous People of Alaska)
 - Black/African Americans
 - Mexican Americans/Chicanas/Chicanos
 - Native American Indians
 - Native Pacific Islanders (Hawaiian/Polynesian/Micronesian)
 - Puerto Ricans
