INTERNATIONAL AND COMPARATIVE EDUCATION MINOR (NON-TEACHING)

The International and Comparative Education minor is designed for undergraduates interested in education. It provides students with the opportunity to study 1) the broad issues involved in both the historical and contemporary debates around education from a global perspective; 2) the cross-cultural sensibility and analytic skills required to conduct comparative inquiry about education systems; and 3) the practical skills and opportunities to make a difference in a cross-cultural or international educational setting. Students seeking a minor in International and Comparative Education are required to complete a total of 15 credit hours of course work.

NOTE:

- Students must complete 15 credits for the minor. All courses must be completed with a grade of C or higher. Courses must average a minimum of 2.0 overall to earn the minor.
- Minimum of 9 credits must be at the 300 level or higher.
- Minimum of 9 and a maximum of 12 credits will be taken in the School of Education.
- Only one (1) education course may double count for both a license addition and an academic minor.
- Only one (1) education course may overlap between an education program and an academic minor.
- No course overlap is allowed between academic minors and/or certificates. (e.g., EDUC-H 340 cannot be used to fulfill a requirement in both the International and Comparative Education minor and the Education Policy minor.)
