



Indiana is the nation's 15th most populous state

Population Growth 2000 to 2007



Indiana's population grew by nearly 43,000 people between 2006 and 2007 to reach a total of 6,345,289 residents.

Indiana

- Since 2000, Indiana's population increased by 265,000. This represents a 4.4 percent total growth and a 0.6% average annual rate of change.
- The U.S. population grew by I percent between 2006 and 2007 to climb above 300 million for the first time.

Indiana

- Indiana's 2000 2007 rate of growth ranked 31st nationally
- Indiana's growth rate over this same period ranked 5th among 12 Midwestern states and exceeded neighboring Illinois, Michigan, and Ohio
- Natural increase (births minus deaths) accounted for 81 percent of Indiana's total population growth between 2000 and 2007
- Indiana has experienced a net in-migration of 53,405 since 2000. Only 5 of 12 Midwestern states have registered positive net migration over this period.

Indiana


- Indiana has seen a net internal migration (movement between states) loss totaling -16,431 since 2000 compared to a net international migration gain of 69,836. Among Midwestern states, only Missouri and South Dakota have had positive net internal migration over this period.
- ▶ Since 2000, population growth in the West (10.9 percent) and the South (10.2 percent) regions continued to outpace the Midwest (3.1 percent) and Northeast (2.0 percent).

Other States

- Nevada returned to the top as the nation's fastest-growing state, with a population increase of 2.9 percent between July 1, 2006, and July 1, 2007, according to estimates released today by the U.S. Census Bureau.
- Arizona, fastest-growing between 2005 and 2006, slipped to second place.
- Louisiana began to rebound from its post-Hurricane Katrina population loss, gaining nearly 50,000 people from July 1, 2006, to July 1, 2007, for a total population of 4.3 million.
- ▶ Texas gained more people than any other state: its 2006-2007 increase of almost 500,000 was ahead of runner-up California, which added slightly more than 300,000.
- California remains the most populous state with about 37 million people.


South and West Out in Front
