


Largest Counties








Total Migration, July 2005 to July 2006




Domestic Migration, July 2005 to July 2006



International Migration Rates








Among the 20 fastest-growing counties from 2000 to 2006, 13 were in the South, four in the West and three in the Midwest




Population Density for Counties July 1, 2006






Population Size for Counties July 1, 2006






Numeric Change in Population for Counties April 1, 2000 to July 1, 2006







Percent Change in Population for Counties April 1, 2000 to July 1, 2006






Numeric Change in Population for Counties July 1, 2005 to July 1, 2006

Method in Brief

□ The county population estimates are calculated using administrative records to estimate components of population change, such as births, deaths, internal and international migration. The estimates reflect changes to the Census 2000 population resulting from legal boundary updates as of Jan. 1 of the estimates year, other geographic program changes and Count Question Resolution (CQR) actions.
